#### A message from your Parish Council.

The year has been a strange one for your Parish Council as we have had to forego our normal face to face meetings in public, but still maintain our programme of work within the Wembdon Parish. This has only been possible due to the immense dedication of your team of Councillors and supporting volunteers.

You can see the results everyday as the Speed Monitor (SID) is still in operation and despite our very strong arguments that we have a problem with speeding cars, our average speeds through the village are actually maintained well below those in many other parishes. We are now installing two additional SID units to try to contain the speeds to sensible levels, knowing that our traffic flows will inevitably increase with the Cokerhurst development, and we continue the years of discussion with County Highways, lobbying them to install further speed management features. Perhaps fortunately, our current traffic densities and traffic speeds put our proposals low on their priority list.

Our Speedwatch team have also been in operation whenever the lockdown situation permitted, supported by the police enforcement team on occasions. Driver details are followed up by the police and action is taken.

An area of great importance for our parishioners during the lockdown has been our allotments. We have rebuilt the fallen section of Wembdon Stone wall and now raked out and repointed the whole length of the wall, so hopefully this wonderful Wembdon feature will stay in place for many decades to come. The allotments have also been cleared of a mountain of miscellaneous waste, which must have collected over generations and the whole area is undergoing a major makeover.

People have needed a place to walk and perhaps contemplate during these difficult times and our newly planted Parklands has been such a haven for so many of us. Whether with a dog, young children, a partner or just on your own, the pathways and the planting have made this a vital area for our wellbeing these past few months.

There have been some mindless incidents of vandalism, which is occurring all over the country of course, but we hope the installation of CCTV will discourage that in the future. We have also seen the impact of CCTV at the Village Hall, where we have just been allowed to publish images when following up a crime. The most recent damage at the Village Hall was caused by four individuals, who were identified within minutes of their images being posted on our Facebook site. We need to manage this process very carefully of course, making sure that names are not identified

on a public page and that images are taken down as soon as identification is confirmed by the police, but that was all completed within 35 minutes and the Council are now working with the local authorities and the Village Hall trustees to establish an appropriate programme of restorative justice for our trouble makers to be enrolled in, when the criminal justice system seems unable to deal with a non-violent offence.

The trustees of your Village Hall have tried to provide a service to our community during the lockdown, with Wembdon Sunshiners pre-school operating throughout and providing a much-needed service which allowed our key workers to maintain their roles in supporting all of us. Our Cricket Club were able to play a couple of months of cricket during the summer and our junior football teams started training and playing in the autumn, only to be cancelled by this latest lockdown, but hopefully they will be up and running again by the time you read this.

As well as these very visible actions, your Parish Council continues to organise all of the maintenance of our green areas including Wembdon Common, where we have just installed three new benches and the VE Day memorial, the village playing field, the areas around the Church and Village Hall, the Parklands and many of our footpaths, as well as removing fallen trees and branches. There are also the regular inspections and repairs of the play equipment which continue in the background and we have a very capable Planning Committee who provide our input and local knowledge to every planning application, ensuring that all applications are now in full compliance with our own planning conditions which are detailed within the Wembdon neighbourhood Plan.

So, despite the Parish Council not meeting in public we do hope that our actions do not go unnoticed. Hopefully life will be able to return to a new normal by the summer of next year and in the meantime, on behalf of all of your Councillors, I ask you to please enjoy your Christmas and New Year in the best way that you can within the current restrictions, please keep yourself safe and we look forward to seeing many of you when we can next hold our Parish Council meeting in public, when we will do our very best to welcome you.

I am enjoying being able to feel part of the Wembdon community and look forward to being able to help our village to overcome the difficulties brought about by the two Lockdown periods.

#### A Logo for Wembdon Parish Council

Many towns and parishes have a logo, but not Wembdon, until now. Your Parish Council decided earlier this year that we should have a logo for use on our website, letter headings and official notices, so we approached local artist Tom Jacobs for ideas incorporating distinctive elements of Wembdon. Our chosen version is based on one of Tom's sketches, and includes the Millennium Bridge, rhyne, willows, and the Village Hall (as displayed on the front cover). #### **UPDATE FROM THE PARISH CENTRE**

Life in the Parish Centre has been so different since Covid began. For a while we were able to open the coffee shop using the double room on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday mornings. Many came and were able to enjoy a coffee and wrapped biscuits in a Covid safe environment.

Way back in August we welcomed the Ukulele group on Thursday mornings and hope to welcome them back when the relevant restrictions are lifted.

We have also welcomed Blossom who are a local organisation who provide care and teaching to young vulnerable adults. They have been able to continue during lock down as have Age UK, who use us as a foot clinic on odd days; also Total care have continued with their training.

However, we all long for the vaccine to be rolled out so that we can welcome our other organisations back.





#### "Keep Up the Good Work!"

What a year it has been at the Parklands! Full of joys and praise from the public. We have seen our beautiful feature red oak start to pick up after the work we completed on the oval bed, layering it with new compost, grit and sand, then we seeded it with sedum. This has been carefully thought out, and the oval will eventually have a carpet of sedum, that will help combat carbon emission in the atmosphere from the busy NDR and are also low in maintenance.

We have tried to go to the Parklands and garden most weekends, weather permitting, picking up litter, watering, weeding and maintaining the borders. Recently, we have been concentrating on filling the insect hotels and they are already filling up with all kinds of insects. In the Spring the roofs of the hotels will be covered in a sedum matting to help combat the carbon emissions. The gardening has been heavy going for only a few volunteers, and we would really love to hear from people who want to step forward and help us in the new year. We have had so much fun and enjoyment caring for this space and appreciate the words of encouragement many people have given us. Lots of people have stopped to speak to us about the project, telling us to "keep up the good work". We are overwhelmed by the thanks and support we have received. People constantly tell us how much they and their families enjoy the natural space to walk in and how much they have benefited from the project.

The animal sculptures have gone down well within the community, and people have commented on how much they enjoy finding the different animals and insects with their children. We are seeing carers bringing those less able into this rejuvenated space, as they now have somewhere to sit with a small picnic, whilst having interesting and colourful nature areas to look out on. For us, this is what makes it all worthwhile, inspiring us to continue our work, simply seeing the smiles and the joy it brings to people's faces.

Recently, we have installed two new additions; a litter bin and dog poo bin, we hope this encourages people to make good use of them. The fencing makes the area feel so much safer for children playing and walkers with dogs, defining the area. This year especially, the Parklands has helped to bring the village together

during this difficult time, bringing a sense of community and inclusiveness, where those most vulnerable are able to enjoy the parklands and make new friends.

**News just in!!** Wembdon PACT have been awarded some extra funding from the HPC Leisure fund. The money will help us to replant and fill in areas where we have lost plants from drowning in last year's extraordinarily wet five months of winter. The money will help to improve the muddy sloped access through the hedge from the Liddall field to the prairie orchard, it will include safer sleeper steps and hogging, leading you down to the little sleeper bridge.

Looking forward we hope to install a nature trail sign with educational information about the area and the wildlife that live in the Parklands. Smaller signs will explain the purpose behind the stumpery and insect hotels. Most importantly, we are working with the Parish Council to install CCTV to help protect this wonderful asset for the community. With your help we are making progress on this and hope to be able to bring you good news on the CCTV, as soon as possible.

We hope you will join us in our weekly Facebook editorial catch up, where we share pictures of what we have been doing at the Parklands. Lorraine and Lorna have been using Facebook to fundraise, by holding birthday fundraisers and have even been given some wonderful donations from people towards the CCTV installation. Lorraine did a sponsored walk to raise awareness of the Parklands Project, and to raise funds for Secret World, who have kindly helped us when we have needed wildlife and ecology advice. If you wish to donate, we have a 'gofundme' page, where people can give directly to the charity if they would like to do so, for information go to our Facebook page.

We would like to thank all the people in the community who have made donations and continue to support the project, and for your input, which is very much valued by all involved. We would like to say a huge thank you to all our volunteers, who have given up their spare time to work on the project with us.

All that remains a to be said is that the Trustees of Wembdon Parklands & Community Together would like to wish you all a very Merry Christmas and a Happy, Healthy and Safe New Year.



Throughout the year we have been holding meetings with our partner groups (in various formats, zoom, garden gazebo, spread out on 6-foot tables in the hall) to review hire charges and other business and

organisational detail. As a multi user facility, with a mix of sport, educational, social and healthy lifestyle, we are not quite unique but certainly rare. These negotiations are an integral part of running the business successfully and fulfilling legal and constitutional requirements. We were also able to fit in all our annual checks and servicing of equipment with Covid safe precautions in place. We are all are looking forward to a time when sports and social life can resume and we can work together as a strong team, committed to providing a community social and sports facility to be enjoyed by all.

Most of our regular groups have been able to restart at some point, albeit with restrictions and copious amounts of sanitiser. QR codes were set up for user groups to assist with Track and Trace.

During late summer, we were able to have some cricket matches and junior football training, in September some junior and senior football matches were played and the bar opened on a limited basis with basic Covid safe protocols in place. By October, it had become apparent that a much tighter Covid secure protocol was required and this was swiftly actioned - Temperature tests on entry, waitress service and social distancing. We rolled out a new event, "Supper at the Green" where people booked a table and ordered a take away to be delivered; we managed 3 Friday nights before the second lock down! BUT we will be back.

Unfortunately, the Craft Fair had to be cancelled on its original date but we have been able to reschedule this.

We feel so sorry for all those people for whom social events, family parties and other celebrations have had to be cancelled or postponed and we look forward to hosting them in the future.

When restrictions ease, we will use social media to advise how and when we will open; this will depend on Government Guide Lines and our own Risk Assessments.

Broadband has now been extended throughout the building. This work was carried out by dedicated members of the committee who work continually to improve and manage the building and grounds.

Wembdon Sunshiners have been in session since September. In addition, their staff worked during the first lockdown to support those families who required childcare for various reasons.

Finally, on behalf of the Trustees and Committee we would like to send sincere Seasons Greetings to everyone. Stay safe, we will meet again!

#### **Wembdon Allotment News**



The winter has begun and the allotments have been put to bed until the spring, although there are plenty of jobs still to do and produce to pick, such as brussel sprouts and parsnips ready for the festive season, and garlic, onion sets and broadbeans planted ready for the spring. All the plots have been rented out and new tenants are making excellent progress getting neglected plots back into a cultivated state. It is so interesting to see the different styles of planning, planting and use of space.

Over the past years many of the allotments have been divided into two plots. There has been more interest in smaller plots, so changes to the allotment paper plan were made accordingly. All plots have been reduced in size so tenants who already rented the old sized plots now have two plots. This has allowed more people the opportunity to rent a plot. New signage has also replaced the old.

A lot of work has been done over the autumn. An excellent job has been done repointing and capping the wall along the track, preserving it for the future.

On the allotments an overgrown area has been cleared to make a pathway across part of the site. Councillor Ian Dyer of Blackmore Farm helped us to clear a pathway across part of the site. His manoeuvrable little digger was able to do the work in a few hours which would have taken months to do manually. More plastic and debris were disposed of at the recycling centre.

Dutch Elm disease reared its head again this year all over the county. Many of the Elm trees along the lower border of the site have been attacked. It became essential to remove them to stop the spread of the disease plus some dead trees were becoming hazardous. The work started this week and will continue at a later date. The view has already opened up and young trees have been left to grow and fill the space.

#### REPORT FROM THE SID & SPEEDWATCH TEAM - NOVEMBER 2020

What are the Parish Council doing about the traffic speeds in Wembdon? It's a question constantly asked of us and probably the hardest to solve. However, we are very proactive and striving for a number of things to get drivers to slow down and keep our residents safe.

#### SO WHAT ARE WE DOING?

- 1. Putting pressure on the leader of Somerset County Council to have a 20 mph Speed Limit through the village.
- 2. Putting pressure on SCC to install a speed reducing cushion top on the zebra crossing to cause vehicles to slow down.
- Installing permanent Speed Indicator Devices on Sandford Hill coming into the village & on Wembdon Rise (see photo below). These will be in place by early 2021.



- 4. Moving our current Speed Indicator Device around other locations in the village on a regular basis. The Police have assured us these are effective and help reduce traffic speeds. Thank you to our team of volunteers who manage this for us.
- 5. Monitoring Speed Data to pass information to our District and County Councillors, as well as to the police speed enforcement unit. Here is the latest for all areas of Wembdon:

Wembdon Rise (westbound) Average speed 26.6 mph; top speed 60 mph; average speeder 43 mph Wembdon Rise (eastbound) Average speed 25.7 mph; top speed 55 mph; average speeder 43 mph Wembdon Hill (going up, west) Average speed 25.4 mph; top speed 55 mph; average speeder 43 mph Wembdon Hill (going down, east) Average speed 23.5 mph; top speed 60 mph; average speeder 44 mph Wembdon Hill (entering the village) Average speed 27.9 mph; top speed 55 mph; average speeder 43 mph Church Rd (towards the church) Average speed 12.2 mph; top speed 40 mph; average speeder 29 mph Church Rd (away from the church) Average speed 15.7 mph; top speed 35 mph; average speeder 28 mph

6. Using Speed Watch volunteers to catch and report speeding drivers to the police. We are incredibly grateful for the work of this team which operate at three risk-assessed, and police approved, sites in the village. Drivers caught speeding receive a letter from the police and in extreme cases will be visited at home by a police officer. COVID restrictions have recently limited their ability to operate safely.

THANK YOU ALL FOR DRIVING CAREFULLY AND WITHIN THE SAFE SPEED LIMIT.

#### The Footpaths of Wembdon & Perry Green

Hence some of the detail is not quite correct!!


Please report back to me any misinformation, footpath blockages or diversions as soon as possible – correcting them may take a bit longer!!

## Ware's Lane to Newtown



Isaiah 31:21




Wembdon Rise into Ware's Lane:
