Latest News:

WPC have requested that the sequencing for the traffic lights at the junction of Wembdon Rise and Homberg Way be reviewed, following several recent accidents and near-misses. The safety railing damage at this junction is also to be inspected by Highways. The section of railings opposite Trinity Way however is not the responsibility of Highways.

Street hording in Wembdon have been removed to comply with planning regs.

WPC are reviewing the spacing of the pedestrian gate accessing the footpath, behind Blake's Farm, following reports that it is too narrow to pass through.

BT have notified us that the phone box on Wembdon Hill will be removed.

Safety concerns raised about the bus stops will be examined again.

WPC are hoping to add "No Smoking" signs to the children's play area, in line with other play facilities in the area. Please respect our children's play space.

Repairs to the Under 6's climbing apparatus has been actioned.

The railings alongside the Millennium Bridge are to be repainted.

An application for lottery funding is being submitted to purchase more defibrillators for additional locations in the village – locations to be confirmed.

ANOTHER dog waste bin is being sited on the maintenance track in the playing fields as a collaboration between WPC and WVHPFT. This is in response to concerns about the excessive quantity of dog fouling on the playing fields.

WPC are investigating tarmacking the footpath from Wares Lane to Homberg Way. In the meantime, we continue work to improve the drainage.

The footpath and cycle-way on Homberg Way near Churchfields is overgrown. This has been reported to Clean Surroundings who will action its clearance.

The contractors on site at the Parish Centre have responded to requests from WPC and cleaned Church Road.

NEW HOUSES ON THE COKERHURST SITE.

We have all (hopefully) seen the Sedgemoor District Council (SDC) draft document for future housing development in our Parish, and we hope that you have already made your responses to http://sedgemoor-consult.limehouse.co.uk/portal/. We are about to move into the next phase, with more detailed plans of what we can expect over the next few years.

SDC Chief Planning Officer, Nick Tait, will be speaking in Wembdon on February 13th to outline these plans. There are opportunities on that day for everyone to make a response.

The school is closed for half term so Nick Tait and his team will be at St Georges School from 2.30pm – 7.00pm to display their future plans and consult with people on an individual basis.

From 7.00 – 8.00pm they will present their plans to the Parish Council and we would welcome anyone from the village to attend.

Don't forget, when the Cokerhurst plans were defeated last time, the District Council were against the proposal put forward by Cavannah Homes. It is up to us to show the Council just how strongly we feel about our village and its future so that we can hopefully maintain District Council support.

Village Hall update

The road entrance off the NDR is complete and the Church Road vehicle entrance is now locked. The Trust would like to take this opportunity to thank all residents, Parish Centre and Church users, local businesses and The Parish Council for co-operating and negotiating with us during the protracted construction phase.

The building is due to be handed over in May 2017.

Bookings are being taken from June 1st 2017.

The official opening events will be on July 1st and 2nd. Further information will be published soon.

During May we will be contacting all those groups who have expressed an interest in using the hall and facilities.

New applicants wishing to book regular clubs, groups or classes are also welcome to attend. Dates and times will be published in mid-March on our website www.wembdonvillagehall.co.uk

Private functions already booked will receive booking forms in early March.

The hall, car park and playing fields will be used fully for the annual WCA Village Day in August; the Flower Show will remain at the Parish Centre in keeping with tradition.

The Trustees will continue to have legal responsibility for the building and land. A hall committee will be formed and will be responsible for the day to day running. All posts will be voluntary. If you are interested in joining the village hall committee to help in anyway, please contact us via the website or 07594299533.

The Trustees are in the process of applying for a premises licence to allow the sale of alcohol, playing of music, showing of films etc to take place at the premises.

The Trust will be the licence holders. Wembdon Cricket Club will staff the bar and The Trustees have appointed a legally qualified person as the Designated Person Responsible. The application for the Premises Licence will show a request for a broad scope of licensable hours for all licensable activities. We have been advised by the Sedgemoor Licensing Officer that it is practical and usual to apply in this manner to enable flexibility; if the application is too prescriptive we would need to apply for an event licence every time we varied the hours. Unless it is a private function (wedding, party) local residents will be welcome to use the bar and participate in the social activity.

Our application also includes the policies and preventions we will adopt to conform to the Crime Commissioner's goals to minimise crime and public disorder and protect all members of the public and property.

Wembdon Community Tree Planting Day.

"Come and plant 200 saplings" was the challenge given by The Trustees of Wembdon Village Hall and Playing Fields Trust when they invited members of the local community to join them on a Community Tree Planting Day, on Saturday November 12th in the new sports fields at The Green, Wembdon, they did! A stream of people arrived during Saturday morning some with children in bright winter suits carrying their beach spades. They proudly planted saplings knowing they were leaving a legacy for future generations. Wembdon 'Beavers' the human kind not the tree nibbling version also helped. Local volunteers from the 'Give an Hour' group, who meet monthly to work on clearing parish land assisted. Pupil representatives from Wembdon St George's primary school have also taken part. The trees all native species were granted free from the Woodland Trust, and included Field Maple, Silver Birch, Dogwood and Hazel. During the previous week, 20 mature Oaks purchased by the Parish Council were planted by the Chairman, encircling the Sports pitches and we see the project moving towards completion. When I first moved to Wembdon, as a 22 year old teacher, I never thought I'd end up taking photos of potholes! However, here I am 40 years later and that's one of the things I do! Since I'd lived here for so long, I felt it was important to be part of the process to maintain and improve the special area that we all live in. I'm prepared to find the time

to work together, with the community, to listen and to act on local issues that may not be enthralling, but which enhance where we all live. That's one reason I joined the Wembdon Community Association and was their Treasurer for 20 years. It's good to see the WCA thriving still and working well with the Parish Council, of which I'm now a member.

In 2014 I retired after a lifetime in education, the last 27 years as Headteacher of a local school. I now run a small dog boarding business from home and as such I'm always out and about walking dogs with my partner Rachel, and keeping an eye on the state of the paths, highways and traffic speed. As part of the Footpaths and Planning committee I'm well placed to see what's happening around our patch. Now the Club has come into the heart of the village, along with our football teams, who will all be able to make use of the fabulous new Village Hall. Great credit goes to all those who have worked so hard to make this become a reality. Wembdon has long had a tradition of sporting excellence, particularly with the youth set-ups. Wembdon needs great facilities to support our sports teams, and other clubs and groups, and the new Village Hall will provide the perfect base for all of us.

DOGS ON THE NEW PLAYING FIELD.

The new playing field has been in use for about 6 months and it is so good to see so many people enjoying this new space. However, whilst most users are very careful, there are a small number of dog owners who are not picking up dog deposits. This has caused problems with children playing football on the small ground and will get much worse when cricket returns in May and many more football matches in September on both pitches.


The Parish Council has worked closely with the Village Hall Trust to plan a way forward. By the end of February new signage will be in place and a new dog bin between the two new areas to keep them completely clean. The signs will forbid any walking of dogs on either field unless they are on a normal lead.

We have worked really hard to clear the Parkland area just over the bridge by the cricket nets and we always hoped that dog owners would use this area to walk dogs off the lead. We feel that this dual provision gives Wembdon a tremendous facility to support the whole community (see map on opposite page).

We would like to put in place a team of volunteers, working in pairs to monitor this new initiative. Each pair in high-vis jackets will walk the area (once a week each pair) to ensure that this new initiative is adhered to. We are prepared to pursue the matter further if problems persist.

We need volunteers to help patrol the area so please contact the Parish Council if you are prepared to help for an hour per week. We hope to operate this from March 1st.

THE BEEKEEPER'S WIFE

I have discovered over this past year that a great many books have been written about bees - the mysticism that surrounds them, their habits, how to keep bees, how to make honey, candles and all things beeswaxy, theories on disappearing bees – but I have not seen a book written by a beekeeper's wife. A beekeeper's wife is a kind of remote beekeeper, one who gets to know everything there is to know about bees without having to wear the protective clothing.....

As the kind of person who would prefer not to suffer stings and bites, being one of the more sensitive-skinned sufferers, my mantra with wasps is "the only good wasp is a dead wasp". Mosquitoes, midges and hornets are more or less in the same category, although I don't go out of my way to shorten their lives so long as they leave me alone. Bees, I have always held in high regard, respecting their contribution to mankind and, until very recently, having absolutely no knowledge of their enthralling and complicated lives.

When husband Mike gently floated the idea of becoming a beekeeper I wasn't too sure, although I did keep my fears about killer bees, huge swarms, multiple bee stings and subsequent death to myself. Too many horror movies, perhaps, but you do read about such things and I had no desire to become a widow owning an unwanted beehive. When he said, however, that he wanted to read up and study the subject first I was quietly relieved, thinking that by the time he had waded through dry text books and wandered around the internet for a few weeks the urge would abate.

My own knowledge of bees at that time was basically that bees sting, they come in two sizes, bumble and worker, they are good for the garden flowers and honey tastes delicious. I also knew, from reading a book no doubt, that beekeepers always had to tell the bees their news, or the bees would leave. Yes, I had a long way to go...

We had already experienced, over the years, several close encounters with bee swarms, due to Lew, our lovely next-door neighbour-but-one. The first we knew of Lew's hives was a warning 'not to use noisy garden machinery this weekend, the bees could be swarming'. To say we were somewhat alarmed was an understatement, as we crept around the garden talking in whispers and fearfully gazing into the sky expecting to

see a black cloud hovering over us any minute. However, if the bees did swarm they didn't do it in our garden that year and we returned to using the hedge trimmer and lawn mower with aplomb.

The following year we were quietly working in the garden, me in my bright yellow t-shirt, when Mike lifted his head. "Do you hear something" he said. I listened. There seemed to be a low hum that was louder than the usual garden background noise.

The low hum intensified and there seemed to be more bees around than usual, flying in an agitated fashion above our heads. "It's my t-shirt" I thought, "I'm attracting the bees." I whipped it over my head, dropped it in the wheelbarrow and picked up my fork to carry on working. "RUN" Mike was already sprinting up the path. I looked up and there, buzzing above my head, was the biggest cloud of bees you could ever imagine. I ran. I should mention here that our half acre piece of England has a fifty foot drop from top to bottom; it's made navigable with a series of steep paths and innumerable steps. To get to the house from where we had been working required taking a flight of steps and up a winding path to the next level, then up another set of steps to the veranda and into the house. Never before or since have had I made that particular journey so rapidly. And where we had had to follow a meandering path up the garden the bees took the shortcut, in a straight line towards the house.

As Mike struggled to pull open the sliding patio doors I watched the swarm advancing on us fast. "Do bees really chase humans" was the thought in my head as we struggled to close the doors. I guess they do, for even as we watched, from the safety of the tightly sealed doors, the bees seemed to almost blacken the room as they buzzed just yards from us.

As quickly as they had arrived, the swarm departed, over the roof of the house. Mike ran to see where they were heading but they had already disappeared, leaving behind just a few stragglers. Although all was quiet after our excitement, and my terror, we didn't venture back out into the garden that day, and I never wore that yellow t-shirt again.
